In closing my thoughts, I'd like to share with you a special part of Christian history that took place over a hundred years ago.

DURING CHRISTMAS 1914, along France's western front, from the English Channel to the Swiss Alps, a famous and uplifting incident took place amid the horrors of World War I. The war was only five months old, yet 800,000 persons had been wounded or killed. But on Christmas Eve, the true story is told that British soldiers raised "Merry Christmas" signs above their trenches. The Germans responded in kind. Soon carols were heard from the German and British trenches alike. Christmas Day found unarmed soldiers from both sides meeting the enemy in the middle of no-man's land for fellowship. Exchanging small gifts, they passed Christmas Day peacefully. The unusual outbreak of peace occurred for miles along the battlefront. At one spot, the British played soccer with the Germans, who won 3-2. In some places, the spontaneous truce continued the next day as neither side was willing to fire the first shot. Finally, fighting resumed when fresh troops arrived, and the high command of both armies ordered that further "informal understandings" with the enemy would be punishable as treason. (Adapted from C. Working Remotely for FBC

Katie Braswell: First Baptist Church Muncie Employee Lives in North Carolina

Active members involved at First Baptist Church from 2011–2015, **Katie Braswell** and her husband, **Casey**, were sad when his work took them to North Carolina. "We always loved FBC and still do," said Katie. "We loved the close-knit, caring people who loved each other and lived life together."

When Katie was talking with a member in January who explained that **Pastor Wade Allen** was leaving, she was told that FBC would need to fill a gap his departure left in some of the digital communications tasks. "I was immediately interested, both because I love FBC and because that is my area of expertise," she said.

In March, Katie was hired as a "digital communications specialist" and has been involved in communications ever since. She has another part-time job working for The Joel Fund, a local nonprofit located near her home in Wake Forest, which is north of Raleigh. Katie has experience in website development, social media, and marketing, which serves her well at both jobs.

For First Baptist Church, Katie creates the graphics for the weekly sermon blogs, edits, and produces the "Wednesday Weekly", the online newsletter people receive electronically every week from FBC. Her work helps the church keep a strong social media presence, and she is linked to keeping and sharing data via Planning Center, the church's administrative software. "I work approximately 10 hours per week," she said, "but sometimes it is considerably less and others quite a bit more."

Recently Katie was involved in creating the "brand" for the Women's Conference, as was evident by the design of the materials created to market the event and printed programs and other tools needed to host the event.

The work for FBC is a good fit for Katie and her busy family. Her boys are **Micah**, 9 ½, and **Simon**, 7. Both boys were born while Katie and Casey were in Muncie and both were dedicated at FBC. Katie homeschools them and supports Casey in his busy life as a finance executive for an area automotive corporation. This fall, Casey's only brother was killed in an outdoor accident, and Katie and Casey both appreciate all the prayers that went up from friends at First Baptist in Muncie.

"We love our local church, Covenant Hope Church, and finally joined last year after spending several years looking for someplace we would love as much as FBC," Katie said. "Being able to work for the church in Muncie and communicate often with old friends and new friends is both exciting and rewarding."

Spencer Goodman Provides Remote Link via Youth Sunday School Class

Sunday afternoons at 4:30 p.m., FBC middle school and high school youth meet via Zoom to participate in Sunday school. Their teacher is **Spencer Goodman**, a dental school student at Case Western Reserve University in Cleveland, Ohio. Often, **Levi Allen**, the son of former pastor **Wade Allen**, is part of those sessions.

"We study a book of the Bible, often hopping around from one book to another. Currently, we are studying the book of Mark. Our pattern is to read Scripture verse by verse and then discuss the Scripture as well as life issues," said Spencer.

Spencer was active at FBC shortly after he was a student at Ball State University. In the academic year 2018–19, he offered his help in working with youth and began teaching FBC youth on Sunday mornings at the church. When he headed to dental school, he was not working with the FBC teens. But when the pandemic stopped in-person worship services in March 2020, the youth began meeting online via Zoom for their Sunday school class.



Spencer agreed to fill in as a teacher one Sunday, and it occurred to him that he could continue to do this and it would bring him a special blessing as well as help the youth enhance their knowledge of the Scripture and current issues.

Spencer grew up in Marion, Indiana, and hopes that when he goes into dental practice—sometime after mid-2023—that he can stay in the Midwest area. Being in dental school has opened his eyes and helped him change priorities. He says that he has learned to face life more seriously.

Spencer and his girlfriend are involved in a non-denominational church in Cleveland and are especially enjoying being in Bible study there.

"This work with the Muncie kids has been good for me, and I believe it has been good for them, too," he said.

Women's Conference Receives High Marks

A total of 65 women attended the "I Am Enough," Women's Conference held at FBC on November 6.

The attendee evaluations showed that most of the women loved the conference, appreciated the keynote speaker, and liked the opportunity to fellowship and share with other Christian women. The work team met to debrief on the session and to focus on what went well and what could be improved.

Get to Know ... Terry Hazlewood

Terry started attending FBC in April of this year. Having been saved and then baptized at Temple Baptist, he was looking around for a different church more centrally located and was pleased to find FBC to be friendly. He also enjoys the worship and preaching.

Terry grew up in Muncie and attended Southside High School. He is the youngest of four children whose father experienced incredible difficulties in World War II.

Terry worked most of his career in transmission shops and even owned a shop from 2009–2012 next door to Richard's Restaurant on Broadway. When the recession hit, he was forced to close the shop.

For the last 10 years, Terry has been on disability. He suffered from congestive heart failure and ultimately experienced a major heart attack. He has been trying to get back to working but has learned from doctors that he shouldn't be doing a full-time job.

One thing that has allowed him to be healthy enough to consider working is having lost 127 pounds. He started with walking and eating fewer carbs due to diabetes, then moved on to becoming a vegetarian and doing strenuous exercises such as using a rowing machine.

In terms of life views, Terry considers himself a moderate. Not speaking merely of a political view but a life's philosophy, Terry says, "Whether it is politics, religion, or whatever, I want to see things from all sides. In terms of politics alone I am not red and I am not blue. I guess you'd say I'm purple!"

Terry has been married but is single now. He never had children but has had the delight of helping two of his friend's children grow up. "I guess you'd say I'm one of their strong male role models."

Although he hasn't passed his one-year mark at First Baptist, Terry knows he wants to become more and more involved with FBC and is considering joining the church.

(An aside: When Terry participated in this interview, he didn't realize that the "Mark" he had been talking with at church was a favorite teacher from his Southside days, nor did Mark Flodder realize that the *Terry Hazelwood* in his classes in the late 70s was Terry, the new guy at FBC!)



In analyzing the responses, our team was able to decipher some of the top needs and desires of the congregation. High on the list was the need for a more definitive, structured children's ministry. Several surveys suggested the need for a full-time youth pastor.

Another area that was heavy with response was for a new pastor that could help grow our numbers, not only by young families but also by individuals from all generations.

Preaching Style
