Opportunities for In-Person Worship and “Goodbye, Allens” Parade

FBC will reopen for in-person worship beginning February 7. Church Clerk Colleen Massoth will keep us apprised as those days approach. Read all churchwide emails to determine the status of that situation and also the stringent guidelines for signing in, where to sit, how to social distance, the importance of wearing a mask, and the like.

Members of the Church Coordination Team (CCT) have continued to meet frequently to examine the issues associated with COVID-19, have remained attentive to the Governor’s guidelines, and have tried to ascertain how to operate. We do not wish for anyone to venture out if they are not comfortable. In fact, several have told us they will not be back until after they have completed the vaccination process. In the meantime, all who have been exposed to anyone with COVID or who are experiencing any symptoms should stay home.

On Wade’s last Sunday, February 14, there will be an opportunity for a “Goodbye Parade” for those from the Sunday morning service and others who would like to participate but did not attend the service. At that time, everyone can drive by the Allens as they stand outside and express brief appreciations and good wishes.

At the end of the service, approximately 12 noon, please line your car up on Adams Street facing east (facing McDonalds if coming from the Ball Foundation building) and attendants will direct you. Allen Family Is Moving to New Ministry in New York

Dr. Wade Allen, our pastor since late August 2008, will leave First Baptist this month to pastor a church in Canandaigua, New York.

Wade came to us from Springfield, Illinois, although he’d had no plan to leave there. After much persuasion from FBC’s search committee, extensive prayers, and visits to our church, it became apparent to Wade and his wife, Christy, that they were being called by the Lord to Muncie. “That is a similar situation to our opportunity in New York,” said Wade. “We weren’t looking to be in a different ministry, but after the church there reached out to us repeatedly, much contemplation and prayer led us to know that God was calling us to a new opportunity.”

When Wade and Christy came to Muncie, their three children, Anna, Dawson, and Levi, were twelve, ten, and four respectively. Anna is now finishing her master's degree and getting married, Dawson is graduating from engineering school, and Levi is in the tenth grade.

There were many milestones during Wade's ministry in Muncie. A year after he arrived, the church celebrated its 150th anniversary. Another key event that was part of his time here included the completion of his doctorate degree from Northern Seminary. Then, in 2017, Wade took a sixteen-week sabbatical from the church, focusing on relaxation and reflection and doing some study on the death of Christendom as he and the family traveled abroad and in different parts of the US. In 2018, the congregation celebrated the tenth anniversary of his ministry here. (Wade's longevity at our church is the second longest in FBC's history.) Finally, he and the Church Coordination Team (CCT) have led the church through the landmines of navigating COVID-19.

During his study at Northern, many will remember Wade teaching us how to use a model of discerning God's will in our decision-making. That model has served us well, and will continue to as we seek God's will using prayer, listening, and seeking God's leading.

All of the church family will have different memories of Wade's 12 ½ years as pastor here. Many youth will remember the winter ski trips and the summer mission trips to Camp Barnabas. Anyone who has ever been part of the CCT will recall his outstanding administrative skills. Everyone will recall his technology-savvy skills that have helped us to have an outstanding church website, and improved communication capabilities that help us all stay abreast of events, times, and other information.

In 2019, a comprehensive evaluation showed us that he had high marks in most areas, especially preaching. One member of the FBC family said, "I learned so much about the Bible under Wade's preaching. I appreciate the Bible-based approach to his ministry and how he walked us through the Bible—even Revelation!"

Christy provided her interior decorating talents to beautify our elegant old church and helped establish things like the Easter breakfast, as well as serving in several ministries. In addition, her work as the wedding coordinator will be missed by people who have weddings at First Baptist Church.

As Wade reflected on their ministry here, he said, "We are grateful to have served this congregation during our children's formative years. You have all been a blessing as you have shown the love of Christ to us. We will always remember the loving congregation as representing Jesus in our lives. We will miss you but will continue to hold you in our prayers as we follow God's calling."

Thank you, Wade, Christy, Anna, Dawson, and Levi for your outstanding leadership, care, and friendship. We will be praying for you in your new opportunity, and we know you will be praying for Muncie First Baptist as we seek a new pastor. God be with you as you go.

The American Baptist Churches of Kentucky and Indiana, led by Soozie Whitten Ford, executive minister, with the help of Dr. Bruce Cochran, region minister, are already at work helping FBC as we seek to find an interim and, ultimately, a permanent pastor. Our interim pastor search team is made up of Emily Anderson, Cheryl Flaherty, and me, and a larger, more long-term team will serve as our pastoral search team and will be assembled from throughout our congregation in the next few weeks.

One directive from the ABC office in Greenwood is to help us look at developmental tasks of the interim period:

1. Discovering our history, including typical patterns of making decisions and communicating—an area where our discernment process will be a great help.
2. Discovering our identity, both internally and as perceived by our community.
3. Dealing with changes in leadership. Inevitably a change in pastors leads to changes in lay leadership as some people take a break and others step up to help.
4. Renewing denominational relationships, a helpful thing as we seek an American Baptist pastor.
5. Preparing for a new pastor: tangible practicalities such as finances, housing, and office space; and intangible preparation by letting go to make room for an important new relationship.

We will commit to keeping the church apprised of our work as the months go by.
